



ANNUAL HIGHLIGHTS OF THE FRIENDS OF ELLISVILLE MARSH 2014-15

MOVING FROM SUCCESS TO SUSTAINABILITY

FINANCIAL CONDITION

The Friends remain in good financial shape, thanks to strong, ongoing support from our members and conservative spending. Going into the fiscal year (July 1st – June 30th), we had \$9,280 in regular operating funds, \$6,800 of which was a grant from Entergy to cover last summer's environmental monitoring costs. Over the last twelve months we spent \$11,279 and took in \$7,625, leaving us with a \$5,625 balance, \$2,000 of which is needed for monitoring this summer. Please give generously so we can raise our operating account to a healthier level.

REGULATORY UPDATE

After performing inlet maintenance work in late March, we applied for a new General Permit (MA-GP) from the US Army Corps of Engineers (ACOE). Our original permit expired in January but was grandfathered. We prepared the application without outside assistance this time, saving the Friends several thousand dollars. The application is now under review and we are optimistic we will receive the new permit.

COASTAL GEOLOGIST EVALUATES OPTIONS FOR ELLISVILLE INLET

Several months ago, Friends' board member Becky Harris suggested contacting Greg Berman, a coastal geologist with the Cape Cod Extension Service and Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution, for his expertise on long-term options for maintaining the Ellisville inlet. Greg visited Ellisville, flew his drone over the inlet and researched sediment flows and tidal dynamics that contribute to inlet blockage. The report he recently delivered to the board is highly informative and is helping shape discussions about the future. Greg shared his insights at our 2015 Annual Meeting on July 25th. 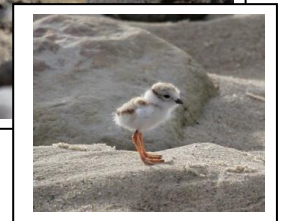
2015 SUMMER INTERNSHIP
