PERMIT APPLICATIONS FILED WITH MASSDEP TO RELOCATE INLET

In the next few weeks, two permit applications prepared on our behalf by LEC Environmental Consulting, Inc. will be submitted to the Massachusetts DEP. A Chapter 91 Waterways license

and Section 401 Water Quality Certification are both needed to move forward with the relocation of the inlet to its historical position just south of the state park rock jetty. The permit applications include project plans that were updated by Land Management Systems, Inc. to reflect changes requested by state agencies during the interagency review we participated in from October to January. three and six months before permits are issued. The final permit needed is a federal discharge permit issued by the US Army Corps of Engineers, which has authority over coastal waterways. We expect to file our permit application with the Corps within the next few months.

VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES GALORE!

During the interagency review process it became clear that the MassDEP will place conditions on the Friends when it issues permits allowing the inlet relocation. We have identified several data gathering requirements and are forming volunteer teams for the following environmental research programs at Ellisville marsh:

- Threatened Birds Program
- Shellfish Survey
- Wetlands Vegetation Monitoring
- Offshore Eelgrass Monitoring
- Water Quality Sampling / Hydrology Data Collection
- Fin Fish Data Collection
- Beach Elevation Monitoring
- Photographic Documentation of Inlet
- Shoaling /sandbars in Ellisville Harbor

As many as 30 of these birds have recently been seen feeding along the wrack line at Ellisville Beach.
