Winter Inlet Maintenance Deferred

The world has taken a break from normal life. But for the Ellisville Marsh Revitalization Project life goes on. All of the Friends' regulatory permits remain in good standing and we received a time-of-year waiver from the MassDEP that would have enabled us to conduct maintenance work on the Ellisville Marsh inlet until March 31st. However, the three nor'easters we experienced so far this winter failed to block the inlet. While a sandbar has formed and may eventually become a blocking spit over time, the Friends' board elected in mid-February to defer inlet maintenance until early 2022. That is the latest the decision can be made, given all the advance planning and regulatory notifications that are required.

A Trio of Winter Nor'easters

This past winter has seen a typical pattern of powerful storms. Three separate nor'easters hit the Massachusetts coastline between December and February. The first, big storm on December 4 brought 6 to 8 foot waves and winds gusting as high as 73 mph on Cape Cod. The rock jetty on Ellisville Harbor State Park on the north side of the salt marsh inlet was still submerged two hours after high tide. Two weeks later, on December 17, another storm rolled in bringing wind gusts over 50 mph and high surf. Record amounts of snow fell in inland areas. A third storm arrived on February 1. This was a classic nor'easter with winds reaching 60-70 mph, again approaching hurricane force. The first two storms pushed large volumes of sand over the jetty and into the inlet but the natural hydraulics of the outgoing tide were able to scour it out of the channel. We were not so lucky with the February storm. A low spit remained in its aftermath but there is hope it will migrate back to the north. Otherwise, the Friends will need to address it next winter. It's wait-and-see.

The Friends have received no word on the project status since early summer of 2020 despite repeated requests to the Commonwealth's project manager and the project consultant for an update. With substantial assistance from Greg Lano, the Friends' unsung political and legislative liaison, we recently drafted and delivered to the MA Executive Office of Energy and Environmental Affairs a request that the Secretary herself intervene so that the status of this important project toward a long-term solution might be determined. Yet another case of "stay tuned" with state officials.
